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# Season's Greetings, Everyone!

Since the summer, the Sanctuary Village Board has been working with our new interim Executive Directors, Ron Gifford and Marta Kiesling from the firm of **Dunleavy**, a professional services firm for non-profits, with decades of experience. We are also being ably guided by our colleagues at **Watchdog**, our construction project managers, who are working with our builder, the very experienced construction firm of **Volumetric Building Companies (VBC)**. VBC has a long track record of doing projects In Philadelphia (and elsewhere), while providing high quality, sustainably produced buildings. We received expert fundraising advice from Tim Apfel of the firm, **Apfel Snyder International**. We held a Board retreat to refine our mission, vision, core values and pillars, with great discussions around our path forward and into the future. These will be posted on or website in the new year.

For now, we are looking towards Spring to break ground at the Holmesburg site and for the City infrastructure work to begin (electrical, storm water drainage, house foundations, sidewalks, and renovations to existing structures). We are shooting for placement of the tiny homes in June, but understand there may be some additional delays in light of the leadership transition at the City. In the meantime, we are actively connecting with program partners and providers, and identifying staffing requirements, to be ready to welcome our residents when the site is fully prepared.

As you will read in this issue, I am happy to share that one of our "mentors" has joined us as a Board member and she is energized to help us move forward.

And in our In the News section, we describe the latest Point in Time count (conducted January 2023) that notes that homelessness rose by 5% in Philly last year. It is so important to have a home and the security it provides. We continue to work every day to make that happen as we have seen time and time



again that this tiny house village works as a stepping stone to permanent housing, and as a way for someone to be in a community, with care and dignity. We are grateful to you for your continued support and interest. ## **Meet Our Builder: VBC**

For the past few months, Sanctuary Village, with the help of our consultants at Watchdog, have been working with VBC on their plans to build our tiny houses — all meeting building code, as agreed upon with the City. Not only does VBC have a great reputation for the structures they build, they are also actually about the people living in the communities where they build.

VBC has a foundation, the <u>VBC Giving</u> Foundation whose mission is to "transform lives by providing high-quality respectful housing for those caught in the housing crisis and left with few to no appropriate options for themselves and their families." In May of this year, the VBC Giving Foundation launched a new Veterans Village in the Frankford section of Philadelphia, a \$6 million, 47-unit housing community based on the principle that 'safe, quality housing is imperative for everyone'. This community was just written up in The Philadelphia Inquirer (Dec. 3, 2023).

We are very excited to be working with VBC and to be getting started on our tiny house soon. They will be built off-site and brought to and finished at the village. We are proud that we have tiny homes that will be attractive, even having a small porch. A portion will be ADA-accessible. And VBC is proud to be working with us!

#### In The News

Recent Axios Article Describes Uptick in Homelessness in Philly. The following is an excerpt from <u>Homelessness up in Philadelphia for Second Year in a Row</u>:

Homelessness rose for a second year in a row in Philadelphia, according to the annual point-in-time survey, conducted in January of 2023. Homelessness in Philadelphia ticked up 5.2% in 2023 compared to the previous year, with a total of 4,725 people experiencing homelessness, per the survey results which were released recently.

Candice Player, Vice President of Outreach for the Philadelphia nonprofit Project HOME, said the number of unhoused individuals is probably significantly higher since the survey does not account for all people, such as those who are couch surfing. She noted that the increase is due to the city's lack of affordable housing, combined with the end of pandemic-era assistance programs.

**Another Worrisome Trend.** The following is an excerpt from <u>Why Are So Many Seniors</u> Homeless in America?:

People over 60 are the "fastest rising group" within the homeless population, reports Dennis Culhane, a professor of social policy at the University of Pennsylvania. In a widely cited 2019 paper, Professor Culhane reported that the population of homeless seniors 65 and older in New York City, Los Angeles County and Boston will probably triple by 2030. And that was before the COVID-19 pandemic hit.

Why are so many baby boomers living on the streets? Inflation, a shrinking supply of affordable housing, and an end to pandemic-era eviction moratoriums have pushed younger boomers out of their homes for the first time, at a stage where they are too old to easily find employment and too young for Social Security.

In response, in Salt Lake City, work began in March on a community of affordable tiny homes to house people experiencing homelessness. The community, The Other Side Village, will initially have 54 tiny homes set aside for formerly unhoused residents plus 25 Airbnb-style rentals to help finance the project.

## **Focus on Partnerships**

Broad Street Ministry. We're deeply grateful for the support we've received from many organizations in the community, especially those groups who also work with persons experiencing homelessness. In late November, Board members Norm Weinstein, Schaunel Steinnagel, and Daniel Wolfson visited Broad Street Ministry and met with two of its leaders, Laure Biron and Geremi James. Laure and Geremi shared great insights and guidance that will help shape our plans for our village. Broad Street Ministry has expressed its support for our mission, and we look forward to a strong and lasting partnership with them.

# **Other Tiny Village News**

**Veterans Grove.** Veterans Outreach of Pennsylvania (VOPA) held a Groundbreaking Ceremony for their new village called "Veterans Grove" in the summer of 2023, a project that will create a tiny home village for veterans facing homelessness in Harrisburg. The village will be on a five-acre plot of land at 1105 S. Front Street in Harrisburg. The land was donated by local philanthropist Peggy Grove.

The Harrisburg tiny house village, which has already attracted more than \$4.1 million in donations, will house 15 residents at any given time and support many more Veterans through a 6,500-square-feet community center. The project was approved by the Harrisburg City Council in July of 2021. VOPA board member John Hickey estimates that construction will be completed in the spring of 2024.

Sanctuary Village Board member Norm Weinstein spoke with VOPA representatives back in June and was inspired by their enthusiasm and dedication to provide homes for veterans in their community. We are excited about sharing information as we move forward to our groundbreaking and construction as well.

Vietnam Veteran Gary Crowell, a former state Cabinet secretary who spoke at the groundbreaking, shared how veterans experiencing homelessness face feelings of isolation, loneliness, anxiety and depression. This project, he said, will help address those issues, giving "a renewed sense of self, selfworth, purpose and hope".

The \$35,000 sponsorship level reflects the current, actual cost of building a tiny home and placing the home onsite, not including ongoing maintenance and repairs. This amount represents a significant increase from early cost estimates which were based on factors known at the time, and accounts for required building code and other compliance needs impacting costs, as well as the significant increase in construction materials and labor since the pandemic.
